1. Foreword

In 2007, FET Colleges will be offering new, modern and exciting vocational qualification aimed at providing young people with relevant knowledge and skills for employment and further learning. This qualification called the National Certificate (Vocational) will replace the outdated N programmes.

The new vocational qualification consists of seven subjects namely, language, mathematics or math literacy and Life Skills with a strong IT component and four vocational subjects. Each of the vocational subjects has a theory and practical component. The programmes run over a year for full-time student, however, it will also be offered part-time. Students who successfully complete the programmes will receive a National Certificate (Vocational). This certificate is awarded at three levels namely Levels 2, 3 and 4 on the NQF.

Amongst the things that young people want to know is where the opportunities are for further learning.

An inability to have an answer to this question leads to frustration and disillusionment. In South Africa we face the critical challenge of ensuring that young people stay in education. This can be in schools, in Further Education and Training Colleges or in higher education institutions. However, the reality is that too many of our young people drop out of the education system. To deter young people from dropping out is imperative to ensure that they gain useful information about opportunities for further learning. Knowledge is power.

This *FET Guide to Opportunities for further learning* is aimed at informing young people about opportunities open to them for further study. This booklet offers important information on the new qualification that will be on offer in all FET colleges from 2007. It also provides answers on some of the frequently asked questions about the new FET College curriculum. In addition, this booklet provides information about possibilities for further study and provides useful information on services and resources relevant to young people.

My department is committed to ensuring that 'the doors of learning and culture' continue to open for the young people of South Africa. I therefore call on young people to explore and embrace the opportunities provided for them by our new democracy.

2. Introducing the new national certificate (Vocational)

From January 2007, the National Certificate (Vocational) –or NC(V) –will replace the NATED courses (N1-N3) at FET colleges. The NC(V) is a new and modern qualification at level 2, 3 and 4 of the National Qualifications Framework (NQF). This NC(V) will be introduced at FET colleges at NQF Level 2 in 2007, Level 3 in 2008 and Level 4 in 2009.

Unlike the N-courses, which are trimester courses, the vocational qualification is a yearlong course.

The practical component of study may be offered in a real workplace environment or in a simulated workplace environment.

The qualification will also provide an opportunity to enter higher education studies subject to appropriate subject combinations.

The structure and rules of combination of subjects for NC (Vocational)

The structure and combination of subjects is applicable at every level of study of the qualification, i.e. level 2, 3 and 4.

SUBJECTS

Three compulsory subjects:

- (Language): This must be one of the official languages in South Africa and should be offered as a language of teaching and learning;
- Mathematics or Mathematical Literacy; and
- Life Orientation.

Four vocational subjects:

These are subjects approved from the sub-field organisation of the NQF (see the list below).

SUB-FIELD PROGRAMMES OFFERED IN THE QUALIFICATION

- The subject combinations in each of these programmes provide a high degree of specialisation for a particular sub-field programme.
- It is important to note that of the four compulsory vocational subjects, the fourth subject may be chosen from any vocational programme to provide the student with either high levels of specialisation, or the opportunity for broader training.
- Generally, the first three vocational subjects listed for each programme are the compulsory subjects, and the others fall in to the pool of optional subjects.

3. Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) related to the National Certificate (Vocational) Qualification.

Many questions related to the National Certificate and its implementation has been asked. Here we provide you, the reader with some of those questions and responses thereto:

Q1. How is the qualification different from the school –based National Curriculum Statement?

A: The ticks in the table below illustrate the key elements common to both qualifications.

Q2. Why was the curriculum changed/reviewed? How are these programmes different from the 'old' ones?

A: The NATED programmes, whilst having some merit, do not provide for the development of cognitive skills or for an integrated approach to learning. There was a separation of practical and theory and the literacy, numeracy and life skills components were not taken care of. This in large part contributed to their unrealistically short duration, resulting in speedy certification at the expense of education. Research has demonstrated that the mere acquisition of practical skills is insufficient to meet the broad economic and specific workplace challenges of the 21st century. Cognitive demands are increasingly being placed even on workers previously regarded as semi-skilled.

The new programmes are therefore of year-long duration, provide for integrated practical and theoretical learning, as well as compel learners to become competent in analysis and synthesis, reading, writing, logical thinking etc. This is catered for through the Fundamental component, comprising Language, Maths/Maths Literacy and Life Orientation.

Q3. How are the fundamental subjects in the National Certificate different from the National Curriculum Statement?

A: The overlap in the content for First Additional Language and Maths and Maths Literacy is about 80%. This indicates a significant overlap and was intentionally designed in this way to ensure equivalence in cognitive demand and to promote mobility between the school NSC and the NC college curriculum.

Q4. Can the language in the National Certificate be any of the other official languages?

A: Yes. All languages are provided for in the NC policy document. Thus far only English has been developed and Afrikaans will be completed by the end of July 2006. The other languages will be developed in the sequence of the needs conveyed to the DoE. Currently Xhosa has emerged as the next language to be developed to meet the needs of the Eastern and the Western Cape.

The language chosen for the fundamental component must also be the language of learning and teaching (LOLT).

Q5. How does the National Certificate link to the SETA programmes?

A: The NC is not a unit standard based qualification but the content for subjects have been mapped against and assembled using unit standards. For this reason much of the content in the vocational subjects overlap with outcomes in unit standards.

Q6. Will the SETAs recognise subjects /levels passed in the National Certificate?

A: The SETAs will take a decision whether they will recognise subjects passed based on the learning outcomes contained in the corresponding Department of Education subject guidelines.

Q7. Will learners who complete a level at school be able to proceed directly into the next level of a college programme?

A: The learner will get credit for those subjects that overlap with the college programme, for e.g. the fundamentals, and perhaps one specialist subject from the NCS (such as Tourism or Hospitality Studies). The other subjects in the vocational specialisation of the college programme will have to be completed before going to the next level.

Q8. Does the NC lead to Higher education?

A: Yes. The DoE is presently in discussions with Higher Education South Africa (HESA) and SAQA.

Q9. What will the learner be qualified to do after 3 years?

A: Learners will essentially have the following options:

- Access work opportunities in a work environment or sector relevant to his/her vocational specialisation (such as a bank /insurance company after doing the Financial, Economics & Accounting programme).
- Access the workplace with the occupational specialisation he/she might have opted for through the 4th subject option (such as motor mechanics after opting for Automotive Repair & Maintenance)
- Decide to progress into higher education
- Pursue further training at the same/horizontal level
- Go into self-employment

Q10. Who will quality assure the practical component of the assessment?

A: The responsibility will be with Umalusi, who may choose to delegate this function to a relevant ETQA.

Q11. Will learners have to be assessed in the workplace?

A: No. However where effective partnerships are in place to make this possible then it can be negotiated between the college and the employer and the assessment conducted in the workplace.

Q12. Who will develop the learner materials?

A: Publishers will do so as per the agreement between the Department and the Publishers Association of South Africa (PASA) and other publishing houses.

Q13. Will all levels (i.e. Levels 2, 3 and 4) of exams be external?

A: Yes

Q14 Will the NQF levels 2 & 3 papers be marked and moderated internally or externally?

A: The Department of Education: National Exams and Assessments will manage the marking and moderation process for all three levels.

Q15. Does the 200 hours allocated per subject refer to contact time?

A: This is a good indication of what the contact time should be. This allocation is based on the premise that there are 40 weeks in the academic year. If each subject is given one hour per day then it amounts to 5 hours per week. The 5 hrs multiplied by 40 weeks gives a total of 200 hours. If less than 200 hours is allocated this should be accounted for by formal assessment tasks assigned to learners.

Q16. Who will provide the certificates at each level?

A: Umalusi. The DoE will issue statements of results.

Q17. Will learners who fail have to repeat the full year?

A: Learners will not have to repeat all subjects but it will cost them a year. The learner may repeat only the failed subjects but will not be allowed to proceed to the next level for any of the other subjects that were passed. Each level must be completed before proceeding to the next level.

Q18. How will the programmes be funded?

A: They will be funded through a new programme –based funding model that has been developed. This means that a sum, expressed in rands, will be allocated to a learner in a specific vocational programme. One portion of this sum (70-80%) will be subsidised by the Department, and the other portion (balance) will be regarded as a sum to be paid by the learner. Colleges will still be able to determine the amount to be paid as student fees. Provinces are expected to guide and approve the margins set in this regard.

Q19. Who will teach Life Orientation?

A: Colleges will have to identify and train personnel to teach this subject. Funds allocated to lecturer training under the Recapitalisation Plan must be used for this purpose.

Q20. Will there be any training for lecturers?

A: The Department will conduct orientation training for lecturers in the 13 programmes over October and November 2006. Training sessions will be of one-week duration per programme. Additional training such as upskilling and reskilling of lecturers to acquire subject expertise or relevant practical exposure must be planned and implemented by the college. An amount of R10 000 per lecturer has been set aside for this at all 50 colleges

Q21. Can Colleges continue to offer short courses?

A: Yes. This is encouraged for colleges to be regarded as responsive. However these courses will not be funded by the DoE and will therefore have to be funded from other sources.

Q22. What happens to the N1-N3 courses not covered by the new programmes (e.g. Clothing production, art and design)?

A: These should be offered via the Setas until such time that they come under the pool of priority programmes offered by the DoE.

Q23. What happens to the N4-N6 programmes from 2007?

A: The status quo remains. The programmes will be modernised and upgraded during 2007

Q24. How will the phasing out of programmes occur?

A: N1, National Certificate in Orientation (NCOR) and National Intermediate Certificate (NIC) - 2007
N2, National Senior Certificate – 2008
N3 - 2009

Q25. Will the National Certificate –Orientation (NCOR) continue to be offered?

A: No. This programme was designed to orientate learners for the Engineering programmes that were offered in trimesters and therefore provided no time for the orientation of learners in the 10-12 weeks of teaching. The new programmes eliminate the need for the NCOR because they are yearlong programmes

Q26. How will artisans be catered for?

A: The Department of Education and the Department of Labour are engaging to determine how the new programmes can be packaged to meet their specific needs, and then be offered by colleges.

Q27. What will happen to learners who cannot afford full-year courses?

A: Colleges may offer payment plans to students whereby the student fees do not have to be collected in full up front.

Q28. Will there be additional exams for learners who fail N1 this year?

A: Yes there will be additional exams for learners to work themselves out of system. These opportunities will be provided in the year following the phase –out of the specific level of programmes.

Q29. How did the Department arrive at the identification of the 13 priority programmes?

A: Initially 10 priority programmes were identified. The additional 3 programmes (Office Administration, Primary Agriculture and Hospitality) were approved via the Department's approval process to accommodate Province-specific priorities.

Q30. How do these programmes link with the government's priorities captured in AsgiSA?

Q31. Do these programmes respond to the needs of industry?

A: The key areas of economic intervention identified in AsgiSA are Infrastructure development as well as Agriculture, Tourism and Business Process Outsourcing (i.e. Call Centre Operations). Engineering skills will be required in the expanded public works programmes (EPWP) and for other targeted infrastructure development. Finance has been identified as a skills need across several sectors. The 13 college programmes cover the skills required to implement AsgiSA.

Q32. What can colleges do if they want to offer programmes that have not as yet been developed?

A: Each programme that will henceforth be developed will have to follow an approval process. The process starts with the completion of a template compiled by and obtainable from the DoE. The templates were also made available to Provincial college curriculum officials. Once the template is completed the college forwards it to the Province for approval and the Province, once approved will forward to the DoE (Chief Director: Programmes, Qualifications and Institutional Support). The DoE will evaluate the proposal and if approved will fund and oversee the development of the vocational programme. The same process will be followed for the development of additional fourth subject options in each of the vocational programmes. These additions will be considered in relation to occupation-specific demands, eg. A specialist welder under the Engineering and Related Design vocational programme.

4. Checklist for Quality at an FET College

Here are some pointers to guide you towards quality at Public FET Colleges:

- ❖ Find out what facilities, such as equipment and workshops are available. These are for the practical side of FET training, so you need to be sure that the equipment is relevant and up-to-date.
- ❖ Find out what student support services are available. These include career guidance, academic support, as well as reading and writing support.
- ❖ Make sure you're getting value for value for money. Compare costs at different FET Colleges for the programme you are interested in.
- ❖ Find out if there are work-place training opportunities while you are still at the college. This can give you the right experience that will make all the difference in finding a job later.
- ❖ Find out what the student pass rate is in the programme you are interested in.
- ❖ Find out what partnerships the college has with businesses and industry to promote the placement of learners.
- ❖ Listen to what people in your community, who have been to that FET College, say about their experience. Have their qualification taken them to where they want to be in their career?
- ❖ Most importantly, do your homework about the career path you want to follow
